Chris Lomax is a proud two-time graduate of the University of Miami. He obtained a Bachelor of Music in Music Business and Entertainment Industries from the Frost School of Music in 2005 and a Juris Doctor degree, with honors, from the School of Law in 2008. During his undergraduate years at the University, Lomax was an active member of United Black Students, B.O.N.D., and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. In law school, he was a member of the Black Law Students Association, International and Comparative Law Review, Trial Team, Moot Court Board, and the Center for Ethics and Public Service. In the spring of 2008, Lomax was inducted into the Iron Arrow Honor Society.

Lomax began his legal career in Washington, D.C., as a trial attorney with the United States Department of Justice Civil Rights Division. While there, Lomax prosecuted hate crimes, human trafficking, and police brutality cases in federal courts throughout the United States. He subsequently completed a federal clerkship with Chief Judge Carl E. Stewart of the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

He currently works as an attorney with Jones Day, a law firm with over 2500 lawyers on five continents. His practice focuses primarily on complex commercial litigation, white-collar criminal defense, and pro bono representation of indigent criminal defendants. In addition to his full-time legal practice, Lomax serves on the teaching faculty of Harvard Law School's trial advocacy workshop and as a guest lecturer at the University of Miami School of Law.

He is a member of the board of directors for both the University of Miami Alumni Association and the University of Miami Law Alumni Association, as well as the Advisory Board for the law school's Center of Ethics and Public Service.

Lomax is married to Bunmi Lomax, an assistant federal public defender and fellow graduate of the University of Miami School of Law. They have two daughters, Arya, 4, and Ace, 1.
